Recent Events...



WHS sponsored Cruise on the Carillon and Visit to Fort Ticonderoga

On a quintessential late summer day, 22 members and friends of the Williston Historical Society met on the Ticonderoga shore to enjoy a 90 minute narrated cruise on Lake Champlain. We boarded the Carillon, a replica of a 1920's touring boat, along with our Captain and narrator. Lake Champlain was clear and smooth as we sailed between the shores of Vermont and New York.





The narrator regaled us with stories of Fort Carillon's/Ticonderoga's battles, captures and occupations, all the while pointing out landmarks where events took place. He also told the story of an ill-fated railroad bridge twice the site of unusual train accidents. He pointed out the house on the Vermont shore where Ethan Allen and Benedict Arnold met in 1775 before the taking of Fort Ticonderoga from the British.



We returned to the New York shore, disembarking on the dock below the Pell Mansion, currently being restored. On the grounds of the mansion are beautiful gardens including the enclosed King's Garden, vegetable gardens, fruit trees and theme flower gardens. William Pell purchased the garrison grounds, which encompassed the ruins of Fort Ticonderoga, in 1820. He landscaped the gardens and parkland, preserving the Fort ruins, as he built his summer home. The Pell family began restoration of the fort in 1909. It

continues today as the non-profit Fort Ticonderoga Association, established by the Pell family in 1931.

Many of the group picnicked on the grounds then went on to explore the reconstructed Fort Ticonderoga with its re-enactors, rooms of artifacts and exhibits, ending the day with a trip up Mount Defiance. From this vantage point one could easily see in their mind's eye the bridge built by American troops between Mt. Independence and the fort; the ridge where thousands of British soldiers awaited their attack on Fort Carillon, held by the French; and both American held Fort Ticonderoga and Mt. Independence as it appeared to British soldiers looking down on it from the artillery placements of Mount Defiance.



Upcoming Events...

The Williston Historical Society recently acquired some stone tools gifted to WHS by the Lynwood Osborne estate. Lynwood's father discovered the tools years ago on the Talcott farm, near where the Williston golf course is now located. The Vermont State Archaeologist, Jess Robinson, has researched them and will speak about the tools and other archaeological digs in Williston at an Historical Society meeting, date to be announced.

Jess is originally from Burlington and now lives in Richmond with his wife and son. He has worked in Vermont as an archeologist in both regulatory and academic settings for over 15 years. Retired State Archaeologist Giovanna Peebles says of Jess, "He is passionate about studying the past and sharing stories with all interested Vermonters…"

When appropriate, the work will be presented at a regularly scheduled meeting of the Williston Historical Society. If a project results in a book, two copies will be provided to WHS.
